Darius Zifonun	Foundation of Sociology (Unit 2 of module: Society, Health and Social Work) This seminar serves as an introduction to sociology. While academic training in social work provides students with the practical skills and techniques to handle their future professional challenges, academic fields like sociology add the necessary theoretical and conceptual backbone. The course starts out with a number of exercises in order to raise our sociological imagination. We will then move on to key concepts in sociological thought (action, interaction, communication, role, norm, group, culture, inequality). Discourse analysis of the construction of gender in social institutions such as politics, law, media, science, art/literature, religion and also in social work concepts, e.g., medical, legal and biological discourses. Building on students' practicum experiences, theoretical and practical approaches will be discussed and applied in exercises, case examples etc. The seminar combines self-study, reading, and critical analysis of texts, small group and full class discussions, and experiential approaches to learning always seeking multiple perspectives. Whoever is using services offered by the professional group of social work is confronted with declining standards of assistance. In the social policy of the EU, temporary programs are increasingly prominent. For social workers, this results in the deregulation of work conditions and wage cuts. Moreover, professionals complain about a growing managerialization. Based on a critical assessment, we will track down potentials for change. In particular, we will work with international comparisons, analyze the role of NGOs and explore the potentials of change through social work.
