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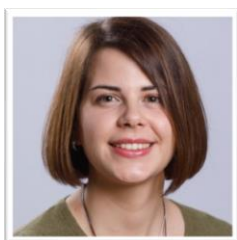

Course Description

This course aims to explore the whole continuum of dispute resolution methods and techniques which may be a replacement for civil litigation, such as negotiations, mediation and conciliation (with a number of intermediary forms) and arbitration. The students will be acquainted with the general theory of non-judicial dispute resolution as an alternative to the proceedings within the institutions of the state justice system, and will learn their main characteristics and special features of the individual methods of alternative dispute resolution (ADR). In the course the students will have an opportunity to analyze and interpret the law of arbitration and mediation at a national level (e.g. Croatian law and the law in the region). However, special attention is also devoted to new trends related to the use of ADR at a European and international level.

Course Description

The focus of the course is on the understanding of concepts of equality and non-discrimination in the EU law. In the introduction to the course the international sources of anti-discrimination law as well as the sources of anti-discrimination law of the Council of Europe are explained. Furthermore, the course deals with the following topics: Development of EU law and policy on equality; Non-discrimination on prohibited grounds (race, gender, sexual

orientation, religion and belief, disability, age, part time and fixed-term work); Direct discrimination; Indirect discrimination; Harassment; Sexual Harassment; Justifications; Remedies; Formal and substantive equality; Equal pay; Family friendly policies; Equal treatment in social security; Anti-discrimination Law in Croatia.

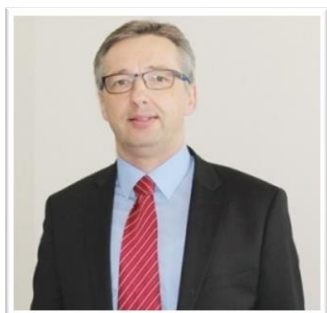

Course Description

The course examines bioethical problems that are of relevance to legal field and, by bringing these problems in relation to human rights, it involves analysis of the development of moral and bioethical argument about the development of health law in particular countries, regions and the world. The course begins with an overview of the health system and its constitutional and legislative framework. Emphasis is placed on the concepts of the right to health, pandemics/epidemics, medical ethics, patients' rights and efficiency and safety in health care, AI, abortion, euthanasia, organ traffickings, gene manipulation etc. While dealing with different topics, the major task of the course is to learn to apply the bioethical theories to practical cases. In the same vein, to critically analyse the role of international organizations, states, legal entities and individuals concerning the right to health and the access to healthcare.

Course Description

Having in mind that the majority of international trade is being conducted by sea lanes, the study of specific legal relations contained in the carriage of goods by sea contracts are a necessity for all lawyers that encounter the aspect of international trade in their daily operations. The legal relations in this field are complex as they represent a fusion of rules contained in the international sale and purchase contracts, rules contained in the carriage of goods by sea contracts, and rules contained in the insurance of goods carried by sea contracts. A detailed examination of these relations represents a necessary step for all students who wish to broaden their understanding of international trade.

Course Description

This course is primarily developed for foreign students who participate in the ERASMUS exchange programme. Students of the Faculty of law of the University of Zagreb can as well enrol the course as an elective subject within the 9th semester of Master of law study. After successfully finishing the course students are expected to gain a general knowledge on the consumer protection law in the European Union, notably its main features, sources of law, regulation techniques and specific provisions. They should be able to enumerate main rights of consumers, main sources of law of consumer protection, fields of protection and main features of consumer protection regulation. Furthermore, students are expected to be able to detect different modalities of judicial and alternative protection of consumer rights. Finally, after successfully finishing the course students are expected to acquire specific knowledge which will help them in solving practical problems

Criminal Law of the European Union

Course Description

The course looks into the competences of the European Union in the area of criminal law. For a long time, criminal law has been considered an issue which falls within the exclusive competence of the Member States of the EU. However, during the historical development of the European integration process, it became obvious that it is necessary for the EU to have competences in the area of criminal law, if it wants to ensure effective application of its policies in matters which fall within its competence. The course looks at the current competences of the EU in the area of criminal law, with particular focus on judicial cooperation in criminal matters, harmonization of national criminal laws and EU institutions established in the area.

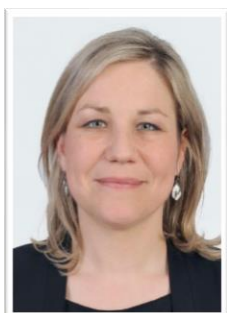

Course Description

This course examines the origins and development of European integration since the turn of the 20th century. The first section of the course considers the antecedents of integration before 1914 and in the Interwar period. It provides a comparative basis for the second part, which focuses on the decade between the Marshall Plan and the Treaties of Rome. The final part of the course deals with the European Communities from their foundation until the Treaty of Maastricht and the evolution and role of the European Union law and institutions in the European Integration process. Through examining the key moments in the political and institutional development of European integration, students will gain a comprehensive and systematic understanding of the history of the EU and better insight into contemporary political and economic relations in Europe, the EU legal system and the process of decision making in the European Union.

Course Description

Teaching units of course are: 1. Introduction: historical development, sources and competences, meaning and importance of electronic media, various aspects of regulation of electronic media, 2. Development of electronic media in the context of information society, influence of high technologies on electronic media development, 3. Convergence of technology, various forms of convergence, influence of convergence on legal framework for electronic media, technological neutrality of legislation for electronic media, 4. Regulatory framework for electronic communications in the EU and Republic of Croatia - basic principles, terms, regulation of technical foundations for broadcasting of electronic media (frequencies, IPTV, universal access, interconnections), 5. Digital dividend and net neutrality - influence on regulation of electronic media services, 6. Regulatory framework for electronic media - comparative analysis of EU and Croatian legislation, 7. Audiovisual media services (linear services) and audiovisual media services on demand (non-linear services), different tiers of rules, 8. Legal regulation of electronic publications as defined in Croatian Electronic media Act, comparative analysis of different approaches in regulation of electronic media content on the Internet, 9. Audiovisual media services regulatory bodies, real and formal independency, various functions of regulatory bodies, 10. Pluralism and diversity of electronic media in information society, importance of pluralism and influence of new technologies, 11. Legal protection of broadcasting, conditional access, aggregation of content, 12. Electronic media and right to privacy, protection of personal data in electronic media, how new technologies influence freedom of speech.

Course Description

English for Law V is an elective advanced course. Judicial decisions of English courts and judgements of the European Court of Human Rights are analyzed. Topics from civil, criminal and international law are discussed. The knowledge of English law of contract and related terminology is applied in the analysis of *Carlyll v. Carbolic Smoke Ball Co.* English criminal law and terminology is outlined in the analysis of ECHR judgment *Tyrer v UK*. International law and terminology is outlined in the analysis of *The Rainbow Warrior*. Various judgments of the ECHR are analyzed. The focus is on legal terminology, written and oral communication skills and understanding the structure and style of legal texts. Different reading strategies are acquired.

EU Climate Change Law

Course Description

This course is aimed at students interested in exploring climate change governance in the European Union and its influence on global standard setting. It covers a broad range of topics which are crucial for understanding the current climate change regime – the scientific basis for regulation, the actors responsible for the development of climate change legislation in the EU, the EU legislative framework with the special focus on the Emission Trading Scheme, the European Green Deal, the proposed Border Carbon Adjustment mechanism and the renewable energy policy, as well as the EU's role in global climate change governance and the impact of climate change on migration. The course will

strive to improve students' problem identification and solving skills in an environment which fosters critical debate. Having taken the course, the students will be able to identify and assess the development of climate change law and policy in the EU.

EU Constitutional Law

Course Description

The course aims to examine the constitutional structure of the European Union, its gradual development through the European integration and the crucial role of the Court of Justice of the EU within that process. Its interactive lectures based on a case-study method will examine the EU's most intriguing constitutional features, such as the principles of direct effect and supremacy; the EU's supranationality and EU federalism; balancing the expansion of EU competences with the retained competences of the Member States; the use of general principles of EU law in CJEU's judicial lawmaking; or EU fundamental rights protection and EU citizenship beyond the market rationale. The course will critically engage with these interesting features of EU law, as well as the complexities arising out of the Union's unique supranationality and its (contested) federal and constitutional nature. By emphasizing the necessity of a methodological approach to the law, the course will lead students to understand the importance of legal interpretation, in general, and engage with the constitutional methods of legal reasoning employed by the Court of Justice when interpreting EU law, in particular.

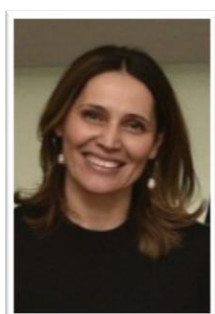

Course Description

The aim of the course European Fiscal Law is to introduce students who have previous knowledge in tax/fiscal law with rules and concepts of European tax and budget law as well as with the sources of funding of the EU and modalities of funds allocation. The students will learn about the rules on harmonization of tax systems with the emphasis on the differences between harmonizing direct and indirect taxes. Harmonized rules on VAT, excise duties as well as corporate income taxation will be discussed. The students will be presented with the overview of EU rules against tax evasion and tax avoidance as well as the EU efforts in fighting tax havens, rules on administrative cooperation and mutual agreement procedures. Some of the most important ECJ judgements in European tax law cases will be analyzed. Apart from the tax topics, the EU Budget is also an important part of the course syllabus. The students will be introduced to the sources of EU's own revenues as well as features and structure of the EU budget and purposes for which the funds may be allocated. Furthermore, the most important EU fiscal rules will be discussed. After covering the most important tax and budget topics, the effects of the European legislation on the Croatian tax and budget system as well as on tax and budget systems of selected EU Member States will be analyzed.

Foundation of European Private Law

Course Description

Private law, as a branch of law governing the legal status and mutual relations of free and equal individuals, is an extremely important area of harmonization of the laws of the Member States of the European Union. The aim of the course is to introduce all students to the specifics of private law in the European Union. During the course, special emphasis shall be placed on the application of EU law in the area of private law relationships and thereto-related contentious issues arising in harmonization of national private law with EU law. The course deals with those areas of private law, which are particularly developed by the EU law, such as contract law, copyright, liability for damages, consumer contract law, remedies, etc. Furthermore, particular emphasis is placed on the function of private law for the development of the digital market by addressing topics related to electronic formation of contracts, blockchain technology, use of platforms for formation of contracts, etc. The course will prepare you to master the terminology used in EU private law, it shall familiarize you with the legal sources of EU private law, the specific principles of EU private law, the case law of the Court of Justice, and it shall help you understand the process of harmonization of European law as well as current problems in harmonization.

Fundamental Rights and Freedoms in Comparative Constitutional Law

Course Description

The concept of "fundamental" rights and freedoms in constitutional law must conform to certain essential conditions: rights and freedoms are not only political proclamations; they are protected through legally binding norms having constitutional character; their regulation is subject to judicial review under specific constitutional tests (e.g. proportionality, strict scrutiny etc.).

In this course students will research and study the said concept from a comparative perspective (e.g. USA, France, Germany, other European countries, Croatia etc.) and as it has been developing in theory and relevant case-law of superior (constitutional) courts. The final evaluation is organized as an open-book written exam.

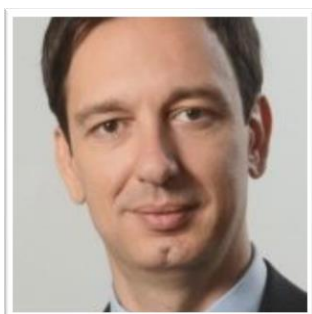

Course Description

The course explores the fundamental issues of political and legal theories, beginning with the understanding of the causes of political theories emergence and their influence on the state and law. By reading past or present philosophical and political texts, students will examine the basic structure and formulated ideas of seminal works in political theory. Focusing on the intersections of political theory and law, emphasis is placed on the fundamental questions of jurisprudence in historical context, without losing awareness of the contemporary reality.

The course also introduces students to the current assessments which are aimed at improvement of structural and operational prevention measures.

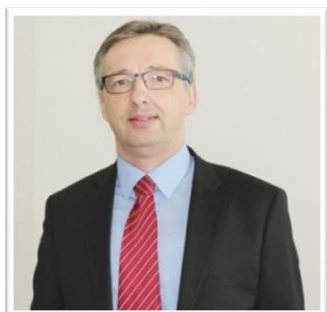

The emphasis will be on the law and practice of international ad hoc tribunals and, in particular, of the permanent International Criminal Court. We will discuss the sources of ICL, international crimes, modes of individual criminal liability, proceedings before the ICC, victims' participation and protection, purpose and future of ICL. Given the dynamic development of this branch of law, the basic textbook will be enriched with excerpts from relevant judgments and decisions of international criminal courts and recent scientific articles. Students are expected to attend classes regularly and to read the literature designated for each class so that they can actively participate in class.

After the completion of the course students should develop an awareness of the importance of international legal regulation concerning the protection of cultural heritage. They should realise that the effective protection of cultural heritage in light of the present challenges within in the international community cannot be achieved solely on the national level, but requires a structured cooperation between states.

The course focuses on the legal regimes for maritime zones and the various uses of the sea, as primarily codified in the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea, signed at Montego Bay, Jamaica, in 1982, but also taking into account other relevant treaties, case law and the practice of states in implementing the law. Upon completion of the course students should develop an awareness on the International Law of the Sea having a crucial role in securing the stability of the world order and assuring the sustainable use and management of the world's oceans and seas.

Course Description

The course examines both theoretical and practical issues of Financial law and financial science, encompassing the theory of taxation as well as normative and practical issues of taxation. At the introductory level, the students will learn about the basic features of any tax: taxpayers, tax base, tax rates and tax preferences. Emphasis will be on three major tax forms: personal income tax, corporate income tax and value added tax, as well as tax procedure. The course will also address international taxation, namely tax treaties, tax avoidance, tax evasion and tax havens. Additionally, some of the most interesting ECJ and tax treaty cases will be analysed. The issues of budgetary law, public loan and public debt will also be discussed, in order to provide students with a full picture of the functioning of public finance system.

Major themes in sociological thinking include the interplay between the individual and society, how society is both stable and changing, the causes and consequences of social inequality, and the social construction of human life. Understanding sociology helps discover and explain social patterns and see how such patterns change over time and in different settings. By making vivid the social basis of everyday life, sociology also develops critical thinking by revealing the social structures and processes that shape diverse forms of human life.

Thereafter, the course considers the contemporary versions of the substantive nondetachment view about the nature of law. It then presents the methodological variant of the nondetachment view. Finally, the course focuses on the role of language and interpretation in understanding the content of the law.

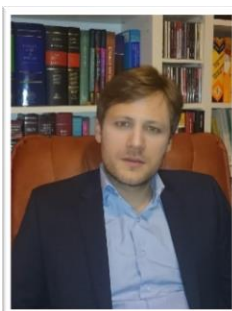

Course Description

The course will provide an overview of the institutes of Roman private law as a foundation of the civil law systems. It will give the students the opportunity to learn and understand how, under which external and internal influences, different institutions, concepts and principles of private law were developed during the Roman legal history. It will be first presented the historical framework and the sources through which the law was created. Afterwards, according to the Gaius' tripartition, the basic notions of status law and family law will be studied. This will be followed with the analysis of property law and the law of obligations. In the latter, the focus will be on the individual sources of obligations, especially contracts, whereby, based on the exegesis of the primary sources, students will be given an insight in the modes of legal argumentation of Roman jurists. In the end, it will be given an overview of general principles and institutes of the law of inheritance and the Roman civil procedure. Providing the background, legal logic and arguments used in the development of Roman private law, the course should also enable students to better understand and critically evaluate the institutes of contemporary private law.

Course Description

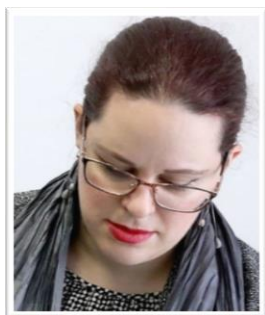

The course is opened to students that have at least basic knowledge in field of research methodology. The course is opened for social work students, but also those outside social work that are interested in applied and engaged research or want to be familiarized with logics of evidence-based practice.

Expected learning outcomes at the level of the course are: 1. Differentiate professional decision-making based on scientific in relation to non-scientific knowledge; 2. Understand the scientific evidence that informs practice and that comes from multiple sources; 3. Analyze the advantages and disadvantages of different approaches in research of social work practice; 4. Justify the choice of a particular approach for practice-based research; 5. Predict ethical and cultural specifics and challenges of conducting engaged research in social work; 6. Understand the process of translating research results into practice; 7. Analyze innovations in social work practice from the perspective of the interconnectedness of science and practice.

Classes will be held in a form of weekly interactive lectures (2 hours) or individualised consultative class for groups with less than five students. The final exam will be in a form of written exam where students will apply their knowledge on given examples.

Course Description

Social work in education course examines the school as a social institution charged with educating and socializing children into society and the role of the social worker in such a host setting. Attention is placed on social work with children and adolescents in school setting and on school as a supportive environment for all students. This course emphasizes roles and tasks of social workers in assisting students, families and schools in cases of social issues that families and students are facing with. The course explores the process of integrating social work values into a school setting and represents school social work interventions in order to minimize the risks that students (and their families) are facing with and to maximize the protective factors of important subjects in the student's surroundings. The role of social worker as a moderator between school, family and resources of local community and team work in school will be examined and discussed.

Law Clinic

The Law Clinic of the University of Zagreb Faculty of Law is a voluntary form of teaching in the final fifth year of the study program. It was founded at the beginning of the academic year 2010/2011 by Professor Alan Uzelac, Ph. D., Head of the Department of Civil Procedure. In the beginning, it was conceived as an experimental form of teaching, which involved students, teaching and research assistants, and a number of professors at the Faculty of Law in Zagreb, to examine whether there was the possibility of introducing such a form of education in the regular curriculum in the final year of the study program.

The guiding principle was to better equip the students in the final year of study for work in practice after they completed their studies, and to allow access to legal advice and information to the poor and socially disadvantaged groups of society who do not have sufficient financial means and cannot get information in any other way simply because they cannot afford a lawyer.

The legal framework within which the Law Clinic operates is the Law on Free Legal Aid. The law divides legal aid into primary and secondary aid, depending on whether or not the provider of free legal aid is allowed to represent the client before the court. As a part of the Faculty of Law, the Law Clinic is authorized to provide only primary legal aid, i.e. the students who work there cannot represent clients before the court; what they can do is give out legal advice and general legal information, as well as provide help in drafting documents for use in administrative and other procedures.

Cases in the Law Clinic are handled both independently and collectively by 3rd, 4th and 5th year students, while being given guidance and case approval by academic mentors – lawyers, teaching and research assistants, as well as professors of the Faculty of Law, which mitigates fears of potential incompetence. All students are organized into groups specializing in particular areas of law, which are recognized to be of the greatest importance for the clients of the Clinic. There are currently eight groups in the Law Clinic:

Group for asylum seekers and aliens

Group for the elimination of discrimination and the rights of minorities

Group for the rights of children and family maintenance

Group for the protection of and assistance to crime victims

Group for the protection of workers' rights

Group for the protection of patients' rights

Group for the protection of citizens in enforcement proceedings

Group for public relations – the editorial board of the magazine Pro Bono

The target population of the Law Clinic comprises people on low income and socially vulnerable groups of society. On the basis of these basic parameters, the triage of clients that address the Law Clinic for help is performed. In order to contact the Clinic and have their case reviewed, one can visit the Clinic premises personally in 6 Žerjavićeva street (preferably with making a prior appointment via phone numbers 01/4811-320 or 01/4811-324, also by which cases can be submitted in exceptional circumstances) or by using the online form. The person on call then writes down all the necessary personal and contact information, as well as the particulars of the case at hand. Using this information, the Law Clinic will decide whether it will accept the case after which, in case it does, the case is given to a student. After the student finishes his/her analysis, the work group in his/her respective Clinic group, comprising of other students, agrees upon the content of the legal advice to be given to the client. The client is informed of the steps taken in solving his/her case, as well as all the pertinent decisions and conclusions the Clinic makes.
