1 Information on Second cycle study programmes

In study year 2023/2024 Call for enrolment will be open for following study programmes:

- 1. Social Work- *full time***
- 2. Community mental health- (*part-time*)**
- 3. Social work with older people – (*part-time*)**

2 Admission requirements and the criteria for applicants' selection in the case of restricted enrolment

Admission requirements

Completed:

- first-cycle study programme in the field of social work, sociology, social pedagogy, pedagogy, psychology or law involving acquisition of 240 credits or
- first-cycle study programme in another professional field involving 240 credits; previously the candidate must have passed differential examinations (25 credits), including three subjects of 4 credits each, and practical work amounting to 10 credits; subjects are: Methodology of Research in Social Work, Theories and Methods in Social Work, Contemporary Social Work in Slovenia and Social Work Practice; in accordance with Article 38.a of the Higher Education Act, these obligations must be fulfilled prior to enrolment in the master's programme or
- three-year revised first-cycle study programme involving acquisition of 180 credits; the candidate must complete an extra year (Supplementary Programme) and thereby acquire the missing 60 credits or
- 4-year professional higher education programme in the fields set out in the first indent; the candidate may enrol in the master's programme under the conditions given in the first indent or
- 4-year professional higher education programme in another professional field; the candidate may enrol in the master's programme under the conditions given in the second indent or
- 3-year professional higher education programme; the candidate may enrol under the conditions given in the third indent.

Enrolment is also open to candidates who have completed equivalent education, defined in items 1. to 6. abroad. They can enrol under the same conditions as candidates who have completed education in Slovenia.

Certificates, diplomas and other qualifications issued outside Slovenia have to undergo recognition of foreign education. The equivalence of foreign education is determined in the procedure set by the Statute of the University of Ljubljana. The procedure must conclude before admission.

Criteria for applicants' selection in the case of restricted enrolment:

Criteria for applicants' selection in the case of restricted enrolment in Master study programmes comprise:

Grade point average in previous studies – 100 % (graduation thesis grade is excluded).

2.1 Curriculum of the Supplementary Programme (60 ECTS)

Graduates from three-year Bachelor programmes must first (prior to enrolment in a Master programme) complete the one-year Supplementary Programme offered by the Faculty.

2.2 Differential exams

Candidates that completed the first-cycle study programme in another professional field involving 240 credits; previously the candidate must have passed differential exams (25 credits), including three subjects of 5 credits each, and practical work amounting to 10 credits; subjects are:

- Methodology of Research in Social Work,
- Theories and Methods in Social Work,
- Contemporary Social Work in Slovenia and
- Social Work Practice.

In accordance with Article 38 of the Higher Education Act, these obligations must be fulfilled prior to enrolment in the master's programme.

2 The basic programme goals and competences achieved by the programme

2.1 The basic programme goals:

1. To enable students to get to know basic values, concepts, mandates, methods and theories of social work on the field of education.
2. To enable students to get to know basic skills, methods and procedures of social work and to be able to independently counsel in education, research work in social work.
3. To enable students, through engaged cooperation in an action project, to create practical integration and/or synthesis of concepts, methods, skills and ethnic treatment.

2.2 The student is qualified to:

The student is qualified to:

General competences:

Students will acquire general competences through the study of compulsory subjects and practical implementation of the field and project work. These competences include:

1. Knowing and understanding
of the fundamental values, principles and skills of modern participatory social work, theories, approaches and methods of modern participatory social work in the field of psychosocial support and help (counselling work), fundamental theories and concepts in social and human sciences that are of key relevance in social work, as well as the basic general knowledge of individual areas of social work.
2. The ability of synthesising

the fundamental concepts of modern participatory social work with the methods of their implementation in the practice of direct and indirect social work, including the ability of synthesising pedagogical, psychological, sociological knowledge into theories, methods and processes of social work, knowledge and understanding of the legal, economic, (social) political and cultural factors of people's life context and their implementation in the practice of social work; the synthesising of various theories in personal theoretical matrices and approaches, and synthesising methods and techniques into a personal style of work or cooperation.

3. The use

of the language of modern participatory social work, the methods and fundamental skills of participatory social work, theories and concepts for action (project) planning or understanding of the nature of the encouraging circumstances for the development of the processes of changes, and the desired outcomes of one's own work, of project-style work, and methods of social work in practical environment.

4. Critical reflection

of the role of social work (along with the consistent use of the ethics of participation, and of empowerment), of the distribution of social power, the role of social policy in social work, and the role of social worker, with taking into account the partner role of the user as an expert by experience, as well as being able to critically reflect on one's own conceptual assumptions and procedures, and to be able to act professionally in their work in terms of social and experiential dimensions, on the positioning of the social worker's own research or development project within legal, historical and political frameworks, of their own cooperation in the project and the mutual interaction between the researcher and the system that they are researching.

5. The ability of ethical conduct

under the Code of Ethics of Social Work so as to ensure the ethics of participation for all actors within social work interactions, in the system of social security, in terms of social and experiential dimensions, and in practical situations.

6. The ability to co-create innovative resolutions in situations of personal or collective distress, of the need for support and help at the level of the user system (the individual, the partner relationships, family, group, organisation, community) and its life world, methods and procedures, the organisation of services, the concepts of social security and policies.

Subject-specific competences

1. Knowledge and understanding

- the fundamental concepts and working (collaborative) approaches of contemporary social work in the fields of counselling in education, youth leisure, mental health and substance use, handicap, ethnicity, migration and gender, psychosocial support and assistance for individuals and families, and care for old people,
- methods and techniques of group work in different areas of social work covered by the programme,
- the developmental patterns, differences and needs of an individual,
- knowledge of and ability to apply contributions from other disciplines relevant to social work with families (psychological and sociological knowledge of the family, knowledge of family therapies);

- the social consequences of an ageing population and the attitudes of modern society towards old people,
- understanding and recognising the principles of deinstitutionalisation, a system of care based on needs and rights, and the processes of coordinated community care,
- the power of users and the contribution they make to create community services,
- contemporary theories of mental health and the community mental health system,
- the micro world of licit and illicit drug use,
- understanding the mechanisms by which the image of the other is constructed in the majority society, and institutional racism as a consequence;
- concepts of ethnicity, forced migration, racism, cultural diversity, globalisation and global (in)justice;
- the construction of borders and liminality, and the processes of exclusion of ethnic minorities and immigrants;
- the characteristics of traumatic experiences, the diversity of their consequences and the forms of help for people suffering from the acute and long-term consequences of traumatic experiences (with a focus on experiences of migration and abuse in the private sphere and in institutions);
- the functioning of institutions and the relationship between the institution and the social environment, a systemic view and action to improve institutional practices in the field of social work, in the selected areas: the protection and respect of children's rights and the child's voice and childhood, old people, people with long-term mental health problems, drug users, handicap, migration and gender, and children's upbringing and education,
- the historical development of social work methods and social security institutions,
- the social science concepts of the sphere of life called leisure and its involvement in young people's world,
- protection/risk factors in various selected areas of social work,
- values in social work and value conflicts and their real implications in social work practice,
- knowledge of methodologies of critical research and evaluation used in social work,
- methods for acquiring and enhancing user knowledge.

2. Ability of synthesising

- various research methods into practical research designs,
- the theoretical doctrinal principles of social work with practical professional work in a chosen field of social work,
- psychological and pedagogical skills for working with children and adults in education,
- of social work doctrine and concepts in the field of leisure,
- of contemporary concepts of collaborative working relationships and original work projects (note-taking, talking, negotiating, organising support and assistance, etc.) with direct practice in selected areas of social work.

3. Application

- of the basic concepts and working (collaborative) approaches of social work in direct practice in selected areas of social work,
- by acquiring general and subject-specific competences, social workers will be able to establish and maintain a working relationship with the family and confidently co-create original community support work projects,
- of the basic concepts and methods of inclusive education,
- of contemporary basic concepts of social work with old people in different roles that social workers assume in working with old people,
- of skills in planning and implementing interventions and practical work in the field of drug use,
- of methods such as needs assessment, personal plan, organisation and coordination of care in the community,
- of methods to help people suffering from the acute and long-term consequences of traumatic experiences,
- of advocacy through a critical analysis of social developments and relations, learning the concepts and techniques of advocacy, the basic concepts and working (collaborative) approaches of participatory, project-based social work in the international context,
- qualitative research methods,
- critical research methods,
- action-research methods,
- the ability to use ICT professionally and effectively to find, select, process, present and communicate information.

4. Critical reflection (with consistent application of the ethics of participation, empowerment)

- the role of the researcher and your own research procedures,
- the role of social worker in selected areas of social work as an expert in the dialogical and collaborative process of co-creating the agreed desired outcomes,
- own conceptual assumptions, approaches, skills, resources, impacts in the field of counselling in the selected areas of social work,
- personal involvement in social work processes,
- own professional procedures and practices in social work practice in selected areas of social work,
- autonomy, (self-)criticism, (self-)evaluation and the pursuit of quality and the defence of the professional autonomy of social work in dialogue with different actors, institutions and the public,
- professional discourses (discursive or epistemological analysis) and their effects in the field of social work in education,
- on the use of the language of social work and developing the professional discipline to redefine the forms of assistance and support to families as co-creators of desired outcomes.

5. Ability of ethical conduct

- in research,
- in specific selected areas of social work,
- in counselling, supervision and learning interactions in the field of education,

- to identify, reflect on and articulate the ethical dimensions of social work situations,
- self-reflection and critical analysis of one's own behaviour and, evaluation,
- promoting greater social openness to include people with disabilities, ethnic minorities, refugees, people with mental health problems, old people and other stigmatised social groups.

6. Ability to co-create innovative solutions

- in processes of protection (prevention) and empowerment of various (user and professional) systems in the context of various selected areas of social work,
- in original support and assistance projects (counselling, planning, care organisation and coordination, community work) in dialogue with different (user and professional) systems in the context of selected areas of social work,
- and the ability to co-create original projects of support and help in dialogue with adults and children, so that all voices are heard;
- in researching and applying research findings to provide innovation in practice,
- and the ability to understand innovation and development in social security and other sectors of the welfare state,
- through setting hypothesis and research questions, designing research plans in partnership with research systems, research,
- by encouraging users to research.

The graduates of the Master's programme will thus be able to practically explore, organise, analyse and also co-create practical solutions, while developing innovative approaches in learning, and offering support to, counselling or helping people in need in a social work-specific way, that differs from the approaches of other profiles dealing with people's distress.

2 The basic programme goals and competences achieved by the programme

2.1 The basic programme goals:

To introduce students to a comprehensive study of social work in the field of mental health within the community and to enhance and supplement their knowledge and skills acquired at the under-graduate level in order to improve the quality of community services working with people suffering from long-term mental distress; to provide students with a focused specialisation in specific areas of mental health within the community such as advocacy, individual planning, working with people in acute mental health crises and providing an internationally comparable skill set. The chief goal of this comprehensive programme is to give students a basic framework for under-standing the scope of the field and to introduce them to current policies and new forms of mental health efforts in the community at home and abroad as well as the processes accompanying those. At the same time, students also gain the ability to understand, critically evaluate and use various research methods in the field and they are equipped with the knowledge and methods for the critical evaluation of mental health practices within the community.

- write scientific texts,
- cooperate in international scientific and practical work.

2 The basic programme goals and competences achieved by the programme

2.1 The basic programme goals:

To guide students towards an in-depth and in-dependent study of social work with older people; to be able to work with the elderly requiring specialised social work in the community or in institutional care for older people and to be able to provide advice in preparing for old age to all generations that are just entering the aging pro-cess and to enable students to acquaint them-selves and understand contemporary theories and practices in social work with older people and their applications in specific practical work in these areas. This programme enables students to gain knowledge in working with people suffering from dementia and those needing long-term care at home or in any institutions for the care of older people. Graduates of the master's programme are educated based on practical work where they identify, analyse, seek solutions and develop innovative approaches to solving problems specific to old people in the spirit of social work.

2.2 The student is qualified to:

General competences

- analyse and synthesise knowledge of old age and ageing in modern society, envisage solutions and consequences of actions in social work with old people,
- master research methods in social work as well as procedures and processes in the area of social work with old people,
- develop critical and self-critical assessment,
- apply knowledge in practice,
- resolve the individual problems of old people arising in the community, institutions for old people and working environments in which older workers are employed,
- develop innovative programmes and methods of operation in social work with old people,
- perform professional work autonomously,
- develop skills in communication, public speaking and presenting opinions,
- reflect on ethics and be committed to professional ethics,
- be cooperative, work in a team or group and pursue community actions,
- make interdisciplinary links between different experts in the field of work with old people and coordinate the work of these experts with emphasis on accommodating the individual needs of the old person.

Subject-specific competences

- knowledge to be able to research the position and role of old people in society,
- knowledge about the prejudice and discrimination against old people in contemporary society, which affects their position in the community and gives social work with old people a special role in the community,
- knowledge on the relevance and role of social work in institutions for old people,
- competence in research in the field of social work with old people, especially in the use of qualitative research methods,
- the ability to use research as a method of social work, enabling the design of innovative forms of work in the field of social work with old people,
- knowledge on the specific role of social work in the integrated care of people with dementia in their home environment and in institutions for old people,
- the ability to develop new, contemporary approaches to the care of people with dementia in the community and in institutions for old people,
- knowledge that would aim to reduce the impact of old people's homes as total institutions on the lives of their residents,
- knowledge and understanding of the risks of old age and ageing in contemporary society,
- the ability to use knowledge about the risks of old age as a challenge for innovative problem solving for old people,
- awareness of the importance of the living environment of old people,
- the ability to co-create an original working project to help an old person,
- the ability to co-create a conversation and take into account the unique life situation of an individual,
- knowledge on the processes of integration, inclusion and exclusion of old people in the community,
- the ability to promote, organise, plan and evaluate community action,
- knowledge and understanding of the legal framework associated with the situation of old people in Slovenia and internationally.

The graduates of the Master's programme will thus be able to identify, analyse, find solutions and develop innovative approaches to solving the problems of old people in a social work-specific way that differs from the approaches of other profiles dealing with people's distress.

To enable students to acquire specific new skills for effective social work with families in a study process that repeatedly calls for the integration of concepts in work projects; to learn to provide support and assistance, enabling students to have a new work experience with families on two levels: building a working relationship that enables co-creation of original work projects for help and cooperation and through the exploration of changes that a family needs in order to achieve desired outcomes; to learn about specialised social work with families in various fields (e.g. divorce, foster care, etc.) and in various institutional contexts (e.g. social work centres, non-governmental organisations).

- the ability of argumentative discussion and co-creation of the desired outcomes in the field of social work with families;
- the ability to preserve and advocate for the professional autonomy of social work in dialogue with various actors, institutions and public;
- knowledge and ability to record and document in the field of social work with families;
- the ability to research and reflect on the personal involvement in the procedures of social work with families;
- the ability to implement the position and ethics of participation in original projects of support and help in the field of social work with families;
- the ability to reflect professionally on one's own practice in the field of social work with families;
- the skills to identify and manage one's own feelings and skills to seek help for oneself.

By acquiring general and subject-specific competences, the social workers will be able to establish and maintain a working relationship with a family and confidently co-create original work projects of community support. They will be able to make sensitive assessments of the social situation and the possibilities offered by the existing institutions in the context of support and help processes, and to innovate in support of the necessary changes. Another important contribution will be a new certainty in the use of the language of social work and in the development of a professional discipline for redefining forms of help and support for families as co-creators of the desired outcomes.
